EnrichLA's Garden Ranger Program offers weekly, interdisciplinary garden-based lessons to thousands of students throughout Los Angeles, corresponding to both California Common Core State Standards and Next Generation Science Standards. The lessons are fun and engaging and provide participants with hands-on opportunities to learn about nutrition, science, and environmental stewardship. In addition to teaching our garden-based curriculum, Garden Rangers also provide maintenance of the gardens throughout the academic school year and during the summer months to ensure the gardens thrive. Funding from the Neighborhood Purpose Grant would help support our program at Dr. James Edward Jones Primary Center through the purchase of materials for both lessons and activities as well as supplies for garden care, like seeds and seedlings.

5) How will this grant be used to primarily support or serve a public purpose and benefit the public at-large. (Grants cannot be used as rewards or prizes for individuals)

EnrichLA's target population is all K-12 students in the Greater Los Angeles area, with priority given to Title 1 schools or schools with a higher than average percentage of socioeconomically disadvantaged students. Our Garden Ranger Program nurtures curiosity, environmental stewardship, and strong relationships with nutritious foods and organic growing practices. We believe providing opportunities for tangible success in the garden translates to the classroom and community as students build compassion, confidence, teamwork and problem solving skills, independence, responsibility, and trust. Students help harvest the foods they grow and share them with their families and community. When children develop healthy relationships with the food they grow in the garden, they are more likely to do so in other aspects of their lives and will encourage their families to support their healthy lifestyle and eating habits. EnrichLA gardens also provide our schools and the surrounding community with open, green space where community members of all ages are routinely invited to participate in garden events and workdays. These events provide community members with a fun, active, fulfilling day spent enriching their own neighborhood.


#### **Voices NC Standing Committees**

1. Beautification, Outreach and Programming (BOP)	Sara Zurita (stakeholder) & Jaime Rabb (Co-Chairs)	The BOP Committee will have the responsibility to discuss issues, promote partnerships on projects and brainstorm ideas to encourage greater community involvement and support. The committee will explore issues and ideas in order to define community identity and values by giving voice to its citizens and providing a form for group action and expression. Also outreach to the VNC stakeholders by utilizing any acceptable and Board approved forms of media (e.g. flyers, newsletters, print, television/electronic media, signs, banners, website, etc.) to inform stakeholders regarding projects and events. The Chair selects meeting site, date and time and meets as directed in these Bylaws.
2. Budget & Finance	Vacant	The Budget and Finance Committee Investigate and pursue sources of income and funding. Make an initial review of project proposals and provide a report to the VNC board with recommendations. Generate a budget for each fiscal year, showing planned income and expenditures. And, maintain the Council budget current and report any issues to the Board.
3. Planning & Land Use	Edward Garren & Estuardo Mazariegos (Co-chairs)	The Planning & Land Use Committee shall review, take public input, report on and make recommendations of actions to the Board on any land use, beautification, and planning issues affecting the community in order to improve the health and quality of life of its citizens. The committee also reviews and recommends action regarding building development projects requiring land use permits within the VNC boundaries; advocates positions on land use and building design for the betterment of the community; and considers and provides recommendations to Council on other topics, such as rezoning, applications, development permits, and any subdivision that require council approval.
4. Senior Services		The Senior Services Committee addresses the needs of senior citizens in the community and provides an environment where seniors can discuss current issues, share ideas and voice their concerns. The committee will be supportive of programs and services that provide seniors with maximum vitality and independence. It will identify, monitor and address issues that have impact upon seniors' quality of life. The committee will promote "Healthy Aging" by creating an environment where individual differences and needs are recognized; by promoting multicultural awareness, understanding and interaction; and by serving as a bridge to access government information and resources.
5. Youth & Education		The Youth & Education Committee addresses the issues, concerns, programs and services related to the education of children, youth and adults and developing specific strategies and policies for influencing and achieving constructive outcomes within schools, classrooms, and other education/learning centers that serve the Voices community. Additionally, this committee has the general responsibility to discuss issues, foster

	collaboration on projects, and brainstorm ideas to encourage greater community involvement/support and participation.
6. Health & Safety	The Health & Safety Committee seeks opportunities to organize and forums to mobilize the community in seeking safety practices. This includes partnering with Neighborhood Watch, Volunteer Safety Task Force (to enhance the Services provided by the School Crossing Guards), School Crossing Guards, Los Angeles Police Department Senior Lead Officers and Traffic Division and the Los Angeles Fire Department. Representatives of VNC will work to formalize a relationship with these City agencies and other entities responsible for "safety issues" in our community.

SUPPORT, Council File 22-1469 to support native landscaping.

Los Angeles is an incredibly important biodiversity hotspot — one of 36 in the world. This motion will not only improve the beauty and diversity of the city's natural environment, but also support the recovery of key species that are vital to the health of the ecosystem.

One of the key pillars of the city's Green New Deal plan is becoming more water independent and native landscaping is a small, but key component of that. Native plants are typically more drought-resistant and require less water than non-native plants. This can help to conserve water resources and reduce our burden on local water supplies. Less watering and overall less maintenance makes these a cost-effective option as well.

We hope that as municipal government agencies discontinue the practice of non native landscaping plants and transition towards native plants that you consider prioritizing low-income and frontline communities that will bear the worst of climate impacts.

Sustainable cities have an obligation to develop smart plans and critically assess how they exacerbate their climate impacts. In this vein, we should be building biodiversity considerations into climate-smart infrastructure decisions.
